The attendees will be able to:

1. Attendees will compare 3 clinical and population factors affecting the treatment of opioid use disorders in criminal justice settings.
2. Attendees will identify 3 ways to address cultural and demographic factors affecting successful implementation of medication assisted treatment (MAT) of opioid use disorders.
3. Attendees will describe 3 strategies for improving efficacy of MAT in criminal justice settings.
4. Attendees will understand differences amongst types of psychotropic medications used to treat opioid use disorders.

Course Description: This webinar is designed to introduce mental health professionals to the latest structure and implementation of evidence-based practices and service delivery models to prevent substance misuse amongst individuals with opioid use disorders (OUD). This course examines medication-assisted treatments (MAT) for opioid use disorders, specifically in criminal justice settings, which have particularly high risk of relapse. This course addresses cultural and demographic considerations that are unique to this clinical population, both during and after treatment. It also identifies characteristics and appropriateness each of the standard medications used, and addresses the challenges encountered by MAT programs. This course provides a resource guide to treating OUD in criminal justice settings and addresses the policies and practices that can mitigate the risk of opioid abuse, overdose, and relapse both during an individual's time in the correctional system and upon release.

The webinar reviews the latest research in the implementation of medication assisted treatment for opioid use disorders in criminal justice settings. It also draws on instructor Dr. Gloria Lee's clinical experience at a psychiatric forensic hospital at a maximum-security prison, intensive outpatient substance abuse treatment programs, and in community-based crime prevention and post-incarceration services.

Gloria Lee, Ph.D., is a licensed clinical psychologist providing bilingual and multicultural services in biobehavioral medicine, psychological research, and mental health consultation throughout the state of California for the past decade. She has provided psychotherapy in inpatient and outpatient settings for both public health and private sectors, has contracted with the State and City & County as a mental health specialist, and serves as a Subject Matter Expert for the California State Board of Psychology. Currently she is serving her 7th term on the Institutional Review Board at the University of San Francisco, and is an active member of the adjunct faculty union. She is also a peer reviewer on the editorial board of the Qualitative Report, a national journal in social science research, and advises masters and doctoral

students in their thesis research. Some of Dr. Lee's favorite parts of the profession are mentoring junior clinicians and training other mental health providers in Animal Assisted Therapy with the help of her dog Maddie, a licensed Psychiatric Service Dog.

2. If the grievance concerns a workshop offering, its content, level of presentation, or the facilities in which the workshop was offered, Dr. Carvajal will mediate and will be the final arbitrator. If the participant requests action, the CEO will:
 - a. attempt to move the participant to another workshop or
 - b. provide a credit for a subsequent year's workshop or
 - c. provide a partial or full refund of the workshop fee

Actions 2b and 2c will require a written note, documenting the grievance, for record keeping purposes. The note need not be signed by the grieved individual.

3. If the grievance concerns WebinarCEclasses CE program, in a specific regard, Dr. Carvajal will attempt to arbitrate.
